I'd call your local energy utility and ask if they have any suggestions. I'm not that familiar with Texas, but here's what I've visited in CA:

\* geothermal energy plant

\* pumped energy storage reservoir (water pumped into it at night when "excess" energy on grid, generators "recover" energy during days when it is needed).

Also, are there any tidal energy stations? (I Googled tidal energy Texas and got some interesting results.)

Approximately 60,000 homes receive their electricity from methane produced in the landfil that is converted to energy. It is a wonderful process that is full of chemistry and physics concepts.

## Hi,

Check with your local power company's outreach program. In Arizona, SRP has an alternative energy development center with solar panels and a hydrogen powered race car. Very cool. Also, are you near a research university? In Arizona, ASU is a center for photosynthesis and solar energy research. At ASU, the kids learn about the latest research in nanotechnology to capture solar energy in ways similar to photosynthesis. Very cool. Check with the outreach programs of the power company and university in your area for good leads. Some outreach programs even have a traveling bus or van which will come to your school with hands-on activities and demonstrations.

I have visited our Palo Verde Nuclear Power Plant in Arizona. The nuclear plant also has a program which will go out to the schools.

Make sure you and your kids are wary of bias and propaganda in all of the field trips. I think lessons about how to detect bias are needed before visiting places which might try to persuade future voters. Follow-up with personal reflection and discussion are also important. Some outreach programs are funded by the company because of protective interests so you must prepare students **before** you visit them.

Good luck. Hope to hear about your experiences.
